- The Scheme and Syllabus of the Political Science programme (First to Eighth Semesters) under the FYUGP pattern were approved and implemented in affiliated colleges under the University w.e.f. 2024 admission vide paper read as (1) above and the modified Scheme and Syllabus for First and Second Semesters were approved and implemented w.e.f. 2025 admission, vide paper read as (2) above.
- The modified Scheme and Syllabus for the IV Semester of the Political Science Programme was approved and implemented w.e.f. 2024 admission, vide paper read as (3) above and the addition of two DSC Courses to the Second Semester Syllabus was approved and implemented w.e.f 2025 Admission, vide paper read as (4) above.
- Meanwhile, the Board of Studies in Political Sciences (Cd), at its meeting held on 21.02.2026 ,vide paper read (5) above, recommended to include new Courses to the Course Basket of FYUG – Political Science Programme w.e.f. 2024, 2025 &2026 Admissions and also to replace the Core Course Human Rights (Course code KU6DSCPOL305) with Political Ideologies (Course Code KU6DSEPOL308) and vice versa and to rename Human Rights (Course code KU6DSCPOL305) as Human Rights in India and Political Ideologies (KU6DSCPOL305) as Modern Political Ideologies w.e.f 2024 admission.
- The minutes of the above meeting of the Board of Studies, along with the syllabi of the proposed courses submitted by the Chairperson vide paper read as (6) above, were forwarded to the Dean, Faculty of Social Sciences and the Dean, after vetting the syllabus vide paper read as (7) above, recommended its approval.
- The Vice-Chancellor after considering the matter in detail, ordered to place the minutes of the meeting of the Board of Studies in Political Sciences (Cd), along with the syllabi of the proposed courses and the remarks of the Dean, Faculty of Social Sciences , before the Standing Committee of the Academic Council for consideration.
- The Standing Committee of the Academic Council, at its meeting held on 16.05.2026, vide paper read (8) above , recommended to approve the same.
- The Vice-Chancellor, after considering the recommendations of the Standing Committee of the Academic Council and in exercise of the powers of the Academic Council conferred under


