ORDER

1.The Revised Regulation for UG programmes in Affiliated colleges under Choice Based Credit and Semester System(in OBE-Outcome Based Education System) was implemented with effect from 2019 Admission vide paper read (1), above.

2.Accordingly, the Scheme, Syllabus & Pattern of Question Paper (Core/Complementary Elective/Generic Elective Course) for B.A.Political Science programme under Choice Based Credit and Semester System (in OBE-Outcome Based Education System) in the Affiliated colleges under the University were implemented with effect from 2019 Admission, subject to reporting to the Academic Council vide paper read (2), above.

3.Subsequently, vide paper read (3) above, the HoD, Dept. of Malayalam and the Principal, Nirmalagiri College requested to rearrange the Complementary Elective Course (Political Science) already allotted in III rd & IV the Semesters as per their request, to II & III Semester of BA Malayalam Course with effect from 2019 admission.

4. Considering the matter the Vice-Chancellor ordered to seek remarks from the Chairpersons of the Board of Studies in Political Science (Combined) and Malayalam (UG).

5. Accordingly, the matter was placed in the meeting of the Board of Studies in Political Science (Combined), held on 20.01.2020 and the Board recommended vide paper read (5) to rearrange the Complementary Elective Courses (3C07POL Elements of Political Science & 4C08POL Indian Constitution and Political System) offered by Political Science from III & IV semester to II & III

Semesters, as 2C07POL Indian Constitution and Political System & 3C08POL Elements of Political Science, for B.A Malayalam Programme, of Nirmalagiri College, w.e.f 2019 admission and the Chairman submitted the Syllabus & Pattern of Question Papers vide papers read (6), above.

The Vice Chancellor after considering the matter in detail and in exercise of the powers of the Academic Council conferred under Section 11(1) of the Chapter III of Kannur University Act 1996, accorded sanction to rearrange Complementary Elective Courses (Political Science) 3C07POL Elements of Political Science & 4C08POL Indian Constitution and Political System from III & IV semester, as 2C07POL Indian Constitution and Political System & 3C08POL Elements of Political Science to II nd & III rd Semesters respectively, for B.A Malayalam Programme under

Choice Based Credit and Semester System (in OBE-Outcome Based Education System), offered at Nirmalagiri College with effect from 2019 Admission, subject to reporting to the Academic Council.
