<u>ORDER</u>

1. As per the paper read (1) above, the Revised Regulations for UG programmes in Affiliated Colleges under Choice Based Credit and Semester System (in OBE-Outcome Based Education System) were implemented with effect from 2019 admission.

2. Subsequently the Scheme, Syllabus & Pattern of Question Paper for Core, Complementary Elective & Generic Elective course of BSW Programme in line with the revised Regulations, *as submitted by the Chairperson BoS, Social Work (Cd)*, were implemented with effect from 2019 admission, as per paper read (2) above.

3. The Syllabus of the Complementary Elective Courses for BSW Programme (**Psychology and Sociology**) were prepared by the Board of Studies in Social Work(Cd) itself, without considering the syllabus prepared by the Board of Studies in Psychology(Cd) and Board of Studies in Sociology(Cd). The Course Code for Complementary Elective Courses were given as 'BSW' instead of the respective code of Psychology and Sociology papers.

4. The Academic Branch as per paper read (3) above, requested the Chairman, Board of Studies in Social Work (Cd) to forward the Scheme and Syllabus of BSW Programme w.e.f 2019 admission, after effecting necessary changes in Course code.

5. As per paper read (4) above, the Chairman,Board of Studies in Social Work (Cd), forwarded the Scheme and Syllabus of Complementary Elective Courses for BSW programme after changing the Course Code of **Sociology** as **1C01SOC(A)** & **3C03SOC(A)** and **Psychology** as **2C02PSY(A)** & **4C04PSY(A)** respectively, and requested for approval for the same by the Chairpersons of BoS in Psychology(Cd) and Sociology (Cd).

6. The Chairperson, Board of Studies in Sociology(Cd), as per the paper read (5) above recommended to approve the Syllabus of Complementary Elective Course-I, **1C01SOC(A)**: **Sociological Concepts for Social Work** prepared by the BoS in Social Work (Cd), for the **first semester of 2019 admission only**, and to adopt the Syllabus of the Complementary Elective Course, as proposed by the BoS in Sociology (Cd), w.e.f Third semester of 2019 admission and

for the admissions following there after.

7. As per paper read (6) above the Board of Studies in Psychology (Cd) recommended to approve the syllabus of Complementary Elective Course prepared by Board of Studies in Social Work (Cd) **only for 2019 admission students** and to adopt the Syllabus of the Complementary Elective Course, as proposed by the BoS, Psychology (Cd), w.e.f 2020 admission onwards.

8. The Vice Chancellor after considering the matter in detail and in exercise of the powers of the Academic Council conferred under Section 11(1), Chapter III of Kannur University Act 1996 and all other enabling provisions read together with, accorded sanction for the following.

a) To modify the Course Code of Complementary Elective Courses for BSW programme 1C01BSW & 3C03BSW of Sociology as 1C01SOC(A) & 3C03SOC(A) and 2C02BSW & 4C04BSW of Psychology as 2C02PSY(A) & 4C04PSY(A) respectively.

b)To adopt the Syllabus of Complementary Elective Course-I, 1C01SOC(A): Sociological Concepts for Social Work prepared by the BoS in Social Work (Cd), for the first semester of 2019 admission only, and to adopt the Syllabus of the Complementary Elective Course, as proposed by the BoS in Sociology (Cd), w.e.f Third semester of 2019 admission and for the admissions following there after.

c) To adopt the syllabus of Complementary Elective Course prepared by Board of Studies in Social Work (Cd) only for 2019 admission and to adopt the Syllabus of the Complementary Elective Course, as proposed by the BoS, Psychology (Cd), w.e.f 2020 admission onwards.
